



The Library Staff Green Team is our third generation Sustainability Team!

The first two generations created a comprehensive Sustainability Plan, dug deep into GHG reduction planning, and joined the Sustainability Libraries Initiative.

The Library Staff Green Team, formed in February 2023, is made up of Library staff spanning multiple departments and job levels. Reviewing the SLI action items to identify things the Library had already done, completing the activities that fell into the action item sections, and integrating these with the goals in the Sustainability Plan has elevated awareness and increased collaboration activities. The opportunity to step outside existing duties, work with different people, and experience new ideas heard and appreciated has generated a level of engagement that is new and exciting. We incorporate the

sustainability work into our existing responsibilities with everyone contributing and sometimes even

having fun!

The Library, through the support of the Corporation, joined the Sustainable Libraries Initiative (SLI) in July 2022.

The Library Staff Green Team was formed in February 2023 and began working on the SLI Certification process.

The Library Staff Green Team submitted their completed action item form to the SLI in April 2024.

Section C Indoor Spaces







Library staff examined factors that impact the indoor air quality of the Library including cleaning products and practices, the Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC) system, workstations, window access, and indoor plants. Changes were made regarding the use of aerosols in the staff bathrooms, ensuring cleaning practices were being followed, and assuring staff members and patrons abide by no-smoking laws.







As part of the Indoor Air Quality Plan we launched a humidity project to assess the humidity and temperature conditions for the library book collections. A hygrometer with 2 sensors and a receiver was set up in a room with primarily art books. Using an app we monitored the humidity and temperature levels over a period of 7 months. The data collected revealed the humidity and temperature levels are within the appropriate range for library books. We will continue to monitor the data to see if changes occur during the warmer months of the year and make recommendations for the HVAC system accordingly.







Access to Fresh Fruits and Vegetables

Our Seed Lending Library, located in the Fowler Branch, offers seeds, resources, and workshops on planting tips, seed saving, and more. The Library plants a garden every year in 6 raised beds in the backyard at Fowler.

The Library Corporation joined a local CSA to provide fresh fruit to the staff. The fruit is from a local orchard and varies week to week.

Section D Transportation







Highlighting our programs and resources that support sustainable transportation options, like our bike racks, electric vehicle charging stations, and video conferencing help us to see what we are already doing and how it matters.

We opened a dialog with the town regarding reworking the existing policies to more directly address sustainable transportation options, although not yet complete, initiating conversations is a big part of raising awareness.

We are excited to have approval to upgrade our delivery van to an electric vehicle in fiscal year 2025!

The Library has been able to build on the Town's resilience planning efforts. We hold programs and partner with many community organizations.



The Library Green Team, formed in January 2023, welcomes the launch of the CFPL Sustainability Newsletter!

In June 2021, the CFPL Corporation published the CFPL Sustrianhility Blan, backed by broad community support. The Plan was among the first formed for a public library, identifying Concord and the CFPL as leaders. The Green Feam support of the Plan and The Sustrianble Libraries institution. Recent highlights of our efforts: the CFPL Corporation contracting with Greener! to identify options for decarbonization; the Library Green Team being well on path to certification with the Sustainable Libraries initiative; and creating new partnerships and programs for our upcoming fifth annual CREW Climate Preparadiness: Week!



he Workshop, the CFPL's new makerspace, launched June 10 and holds workshop including a sustainability-focused program once a month. A Library of Things has been added to include kuniting, weaving, and tech-focused items.

ZERO WASTE UPDATES

Refuse – the Main Library added a new bottlefilling water fountain on the main floor for use by the public, and inline water filtering systems in both staff break rooms to replace use of bottled water and water coolers.

Reduce – the Library is no longer offering paper receipts (unless requested), and now uses recyclable paper for receipts. The CFPL has offset the equivalent of 83,333 pages of paper consumption to date.

Reuse – the Library offers other Town departments, libraries, and local nonprofits any unneeded office furniture.

Recycle – the Library streamlined containers and signage on trash and recycling bins. The Library also contracts to recycle surplus technology and media twice a year.

Rot – the Library recently started a staff composting pilot project to compost food waste in staff break rooms at both locations.





In December, the Friends of the Library held their annual Holiday Book Sale and this year they made a record-breaking \$18,058! This would not be possible without the high quality donated items they receive from the community so they are thankful for everyone who has donated. The annual book sales are truly community reusing and recycling at its finest!

The Library is currently preparing for our witner Seed sow programs. The gallon jugs (pictured below) will become mini greenhouses on JT at Verrill Farm and on 1/20 at the Fowler Branch with Lady Fern Farm (see page two for more event details). Thanks to generous donations from Concord Teacedse and Saltbox Kitchen we are well on our way, but we will happily accept your donations of clear gallon jugs at Fowlert This is a great way to grow native plants from seed which promotes biodiversity and helps out local pollinators once the plants are in the ground.



of sure what to do with your post-holiday waste? Make sure to check the MA gescylopedia for tips. Did you know that wreaths, garlands, and any cards or gift bags with gitter should go in the trash and not the recycling/compost?

ZERO WASTE UPDATES

Refuse – for the Main Library's 150th anniversary celebration and for staff day, the Library refused plasticware when serving food and chose compostable options instead.

Reduce – the Library has offset the equivalent of 83,333 total standard pages of paper consumption since joining the PrintReleaf Exchange in August.

Reuse – the Reference Department is collecting used bubble mailers to reuse when sending items out on interlibrary loan.


Recycle – the Children's Library has partnered with the CCHS Sunrise Club to collect #6 plastics for the Sunrise Club to use in activities. First up is making shrinky dinks!

Rot – in our time composting with Black Earth, the Library has diverted 132 pounds of trash from landfills.

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We launched quarterly sustainability electronic newsletter Fall 2023 and maintain our Climate Hub.

Scope of Collection

The Library seeks to develop an outstanding collection for a diverse population within the constraints of budget allocations and shelf space and taking into consideration the availability of network transfer, interlibrary loan or online sources. It strives to provide materials in a variety of formats for a variety of audiences, reflecting multiple perspectives. The collection contains a wide range of popular and classic fiction for children, young adults, and adults, as well as non-fiction materials, covering a wide range of subjects. There are smaller collections in world languages, in both print and audiovisual. The collection is designed to meet the interests and information needs of the community.

Collection Maintenance/Replacements/Deselection/Weeding/Discarding Treatment and repair decisions will reflect an item's frequency of use, structural soundness, and importance or uniqueness to both the Concord Free Public Library and the Minuteman Library Network.

In the interest of sustainability, whenever it is possible, items withdrawn from the collection will be donated, recycled, reused, or repurposed.

Future plans



The Library Staff Green Team and Library staff have been actively engaged throughout the Sustainable Libraries Initiative certification process and look forward to continued learning and sharing with the community. Ideas for our continuing work towards Triple Bottom Line sustainability in the future include:

- Annual Tree Seedling giveaway

- Continue toward meeting GHG reduction targets and goal of net zero emissions
- Continue with programs and events that focus on sustainability
