

Films at Fowler (on Kanopy and Zoom)



Films at Fowler continues in fall 2023 with six classic movies!

For 26 years Concord film viewers gathered on winter evenings at Fowler Library to see some of the most interesting and stimulating examples of current and classic cinema from around the world. That movie series, now called **Films at Fowler**, changed to an online video streaming format in 2021 and continues in that format in 2023. Because we do not meet in person, we now watch—on our own schedule—selected movies on Kanopy, a free streaming service available to Library patrons. We then gather on Zoom on scheduled evenings for a lively movie discussion. **Finding Family** will be continue as our theme for the fall. The movies are in some way about the many pleasures and problems of belonging to a family, whether conventional or unconventional. This poster shows the selected films to be viewed on Kanopy and the discussion dates on Zoom.



Tell No One (2006). New evidence implicates a bereaved man in the murder of his wife. Then he receives a video showing she is still alive. He must prove his innocence while hunted by police. Discussion date on Zoom: Wednesday September 6 at 7 p.m.

Ghost World (2001). In this cult comedy, two teenage outsiders (Thora Birch, Scarlett Johansson) face a rift in their relationship when one of them becomes interested in a shy older man. Discussion date on Zoom: Wednesday September 20 at 7 p.m.

Safety Last (1923). In this silent romantic comedy, an ambitious young man (Harold Lloyd) hopes to win money in a promotional stunt by climbing the outside of the building where he works. Discussion date on Zoom: Wednesday October 4 at 7 p.m.

I'm Your Man (2021). A lonely scientist in Berlin participates in a research study. For three weeks, she must live with a humanoid robot (Dan Stevens) designed to be her perfect life partner. Discussion date on Zoom: Wednesday October 18 at 7 p.m.

Howards End (1992). This gorgeous adaptation of the E.M. Forster novel follows the lives of two sisters in London during a time of social change. Nominated for nine Academy Awards. Discussion date on Zoom: Wednesday November 1 at 7 p.m.

L'Avventura (1960). In Michelangelo Antonioni's existential classic a group of friends take a boat trip to a remote island. A mystery develops when one of the friends goes missing. Discussion date on Zoom: Wednesday November 15 at 7 p.m.
