January 24, 7:00 pm The Lives of Others (Germany, 2006)



January 31, 7:00 pm *The Well-Digger's Daughter* (France, 2011)

Daniel Auteuil directed and and stars as a poor laborer whose world is turned upside-down when his beloved daughter falls in love with a dashing, wealthy pilot, who is called away to fight in World War I. *Not Rated*

February 14, 7:00 pm Kinamand (Denmark, 2005)

After Keld's wife leaves him, he becomes a regular at a Chinese restaurant. He is offered a large sum of money to marry the restaurant owner's sister so she can become a Danish citizen. Will the marriage be a charade or a chance for new love? Directed by Henrik Ruben Genz. *Not Rated*



February 21, 7:00 pm The Intouchables (France, 2011)

Wealthy quadriplegic Philippe, seeking a caretaker, hires ex-con Driss, and they set out on adventures that change both men's lives. Directed by Olivier Nakache and Eric Toledano, this was the second most successful French film ever. *Rated R*

★ Main Library, 129 Main St. Wonder: The Lives of Anna and Harlan Hubbard (USA, 2012)

Wendell Berry narrates this lyrical documentary about Anna & Harlan Hubbard, who followed Thoreau's example in leading a life of simplicity. *Wonder* considers the Hubbards' astonishing life of freedom and contentment, and what it says to Americans today.
